Background & Purpose

We all have a shared sense of urgency around improving student outcomes

School and district leaders, community members, education nonprofits, and funders share a strong interest in improving student outcomes and school conditions.



Yet new reforms are rarely catalytic

Despite decades of efforts and billions of dollars of investment—particularly from philanthropy and at the federal level—new reform efforts rarely have their intended impacts.

And sustained improvement has proven to be a challenge for many districts

While there are legitimate questions about the efficacy of particular interventions, even effective efforts are not readily sustained, and community stakeholders rarely have insights into why.



The District Readiness Index (DRI) is an interactive, web-based tool that integrates publicly available data about school districts' conditions to scale educational innovation and sustain improvement.

After decades of working in education, we noticed organizational patterns among low-performing school districts

- Convened educators, administrators, and researchers
- Identified important district organizational areas that support student achievement
- Researchers piloted hundreds of area-relevant indicators
- Began prototyping data visualization tools for California, Idaho, and Massachusetts
- Refined data definitions& collection procedures
- Collected data across multiple sources
- Solicited feedback from districts, community leaders, and parents

The District Readiness Index supports other data tools

The District Readiness Index

- Measures district-level (vs. school level) organizational conditions that impact how a district operates.
- Serves as a benchmark for improvement (not as an accountability tool).
- Focuses on actionable issues that district leaders can affect.

Other Education Data Tools

- Often focus on **student outcomes** or self-evaluations to "grade" districts and schools.
- May lead to district or state-level sanctions/requirements as part of the public accountability system.



The DRI aims to support and sustain district-level change

If educational stakeholders...

- Access data across the domains associated with a school system's organizational prowess
- Assess school systems' readiness to implement, sustain, and scale improvement initiatives
- Learn lessons from nearby or similar school districts



Then they can...

- Identify the enabling conditions for continuous improvement in student outcomes
- Target limited resources (\$\$, talent, partnerships) for greater impact
- Advocate for data-informed changes



Each set of indicators addresses a key condition of district readiness

Family & Community Engagement



District decision-making processes, resources, and capacities provide local stakeholders a seat at the table.

Financial Management



The district maintains enough financial flexibility to invest in sustainable reforms.

Leadership & Governance



District leaders stay long enough and adopt policies to sustain major initiatives.

School Personnel



The district adequately and equitably recruited personnel and retained them in their schools.

Work Environment



The district and teacher's union demonstrate the ability to collaborate and their investment in educators.





The Relevance of Readiness

The majority of CA districts have Partial Foundations to Improve Education

Distribution of DRI Districts by District Readiness Rating






NOTE: N = 423.

Distribution of DRI Districts by Domain Ratings






Before the pandemic, greater levels of district readiness were generally associated with higher student achievement.


Distribution of District Readiness Ratings by Achievement Quartile

2018-19 Smarter Balanced




Average Percentage of Students Who Met or Exceeded State Standards

Associations between district readiness and student achievement continue two years into the pandemic.






When we control for demographic factors, conditions related to district readiness are associated with greater student outcomes.


Point Estimates for District Readiness Ratings on ELA Outcomes

Consider specific areas to target system improvement efforts




